President's Letter

Hello Fellow KY YFA Members,

I hope this letter finds everyone in good health and spirits as this growing season is in full swing. In this newsletter you will find a recap from state convention and the most up to date information about summer tour and National Institute. I would like to thank the Daviess County chapter and their advisor Tyler Miller for hosting the state convention in Owensboro in March. This was Tyler's first convention as an advisor and alongside his members they did an excellent job.

Summer Tour in 2016 will be a little different from years past as it will be a one day tour and a day at Holiday World and Splashing Safari in Santa Clause, Indiana. The dates for the tour will be July 8th and 9th with the State Board meeting on the 7th. We will again be staying at the Holiday Inn in Downtown Owensboro. The room rate will be \$119 a night. There will be rooms available on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. Our tentative agenda will be as follows: Friday we will start out at the hotel with breakfast on your own, we will then load buses and head to the Becks Practical Research Farm in Henderson, KY. We will spend some time there touring and learning how they conduct their yearly research and what they do with the data they receive. We will eat lunch there and continue the tour until midafternoon. At that time, we will leave the Farm and travel to either a farm belonging to a Daviess County member or a Park on the west side of Daviess County. There we will have dinner and a short business session. When business is concluded, we will travel back to the hotel where everyone will be free to spend the rest of the evening on their own in downtown Owensboro. On Saturday, we will have group rate tickets to Holiday World and Splashing Safari. Tickets will need to be paid for in advance with registration. Tickets will be NON-Date Specific, meaning that the tickets can be used at any time to go to the park. This way, in the event of a rain storm, the tickets can be used another day. It also means if you have plans to attend Holiday World another day, then you can go ahead and purchase the tickets at our discounted rate.

If everyone remembers, at state convention we had an amendment to the By-laws brought up that will be voted on at summer tour. I would encourage every chapter to have at least one member present for the business session, but remember each chapter paying dues has 2 voting delegates. Since State convention, myself and 5 other members from around the state have been working to get the most up to date set of By-laws for use by our organization. As of this time we have a complete set, but are working diligently to get updates put into place. If anyone has any changes they would like to see made, please submit them in writing ASAP to Mike Ross and he will get them to the committee. Just to remind everyone, the only changes that can be made by this committee are wording and language changes. Anything that will change the meaning of an article or section will have to be brought up during a business session and voted on by a majority of the delegates.

Most everyone I have been in contact with have been able to get some spring time work done, for some it may be the first hay cut for the season, some type of tillage, or even corn or beans planted. We have experienced a large amount of rain over the last week that has slowed down the planting season, and as I conclude this letter I would like to remind everyone to be safe as we get back into the fields over the next few weeks. There are many ways to cut corners, but sometimes cutting corners ends up costing us more in the long run. I look forward to seeing everyone in person at Summer Tour.

Congratulations are in order for the leaders of the local chapters and the advisors that work with those chapters whose efforts have resulted in a 4.4% increase in membership over the last year. With the ever increasing constraints on people's time, this is a great indicator of the value of the Kentucky YFA program.

Special thanks goes to the Daviess County Chapter and YFA Chapter Advisor Tyler Miller. They all did an excellent job hosting a great state convention. I know from my perspective, working with the staff at the Owensboro Convention Center was a great experience. I would also like to thank Grant Hildabrand and the rest of the State Officer Team for the great job they did planning and conducting the State Convention as well. The state executive committee is already well into planning next year's State Convention in Lexington.

A special thanks also goes to our Sponsors for their generous and continuing support. Your support makes it possible to provide valuable leadership experience and recognition for a great group of Kentucky's finest Young Farmers and their families.

I want to update you on the current financial state for our adult programs and how it will likely affect KY YFA. Higher Ed and the KCTCS family did not fare well when the final budget was enacted in the Kentucky General Assembly last month. There are still some final issues to be ironed out, but KCTCS and many other programs had to absorb a 2% reduction for the current year. In addition, a 4.5% cut will be forthcoming for the next two-year biennium budget. There are some other factors affecting the final outcomes of these cuts, but these will have an impact on our programs. I will be sharing that information with instructors when that picture becomes clear.

The Daviess County Chapter will be hosting summer tour on July 8th and 9th in Owensboro and are excited to offer both some great Agriculture experiences as well as the opportunity to get some family activities in as well. Please mark your calendars and make plans to participate this summer.

Very few other professions are so dependent on so many factors that are out of our control like Agriculture. I am less than a year into this current position and I marvel at the Young Farmer members and their families in what they do year in and year out to make our industry so strong. The strength and leadership of our members is evident every time I look at an application and listen to a group of members speak. You are integral parts of your local business community, agriculture community and so many others facets where you live and work that it would be impossible to list. Thank you for what you do for the Agriculture Profession and the many other things that are so important to your family and community. My prayers are always for well-timed rain or sun when needed that lead to a successful and prosperous harvest.

We also had the opportunity to tour a feed mill where peanut butter and donuts found its place in a feed ration.

Coming up in the later part of April is the CPH-45 calf sale. We have several young farmer members in Daviess County who take advantage of this sale. The CPH-45 sale occurs four times throughout the year and is very beneficial to area farmers.

As spring progresses and everyone begins to become busier, I wish for everyone across the state to have a safe and productive spring!

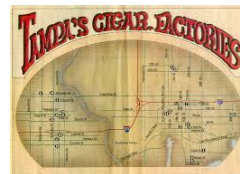
